They range from physical characteristics that are immediately observable, such as color of hair, skin and eyes, to the subtler aspects of intelligence and aptitudes. Some races have genetic susceptibility to certain diseases or physical disorders.
2. The human race as distinguished from other animals.
3. Ancestry, tribal or national origin.
4. In recent times, in American political language, race has come to designate issues or attitudes concerning blacks... Race has thus moved from a term signifying high distinction or complex scientific differentiation to one that implies an unacceptable prejudice.
